


President's **Notes**

End of the fire season 2023/2024



PLEASE USE QR CODE TO NOTIFY US WHEN BURNING



The end of the statutory fire season period ended on 31 March 2024. This means you can burn off from April 1, 2024 until 30 September 2024 without a fire permit. There are other mandatory things you HAVE to do (By law). Those things are: An online notification, (OR code attached) where you identify your property and agree to comply with some rules and regulations. ALSO, you must notify ALL your adjoining neighbours. BOTH of these, you must do at least 24 hours prior to lighting the fire. Failure to do both of these can result in our, or other brigades responding to what might be thought of as an out of control fire, and wasting the time of volunteers and paid RFS staff. The RFS recommends that burning off is done in the off season and during the cooler months, when the fire risk is low. Burning off what is known as a "pile burn" is permitted. Piles should be no

more than 1.5 metres high and a recommended width of 2 metres wide or long. Pile burns should be located well away from buildings, power lines and trees. Material should be dry and vegetation only. No pallets, treated pine or building materials should be burnt. Large bonfires are not pile burns, and can throw off huge amounts of radiant heat which can damage buildings and powerlines that might be considered a safe distance away. They are also very hard to extinguish and control once lit. These recommendations are provided for your safety, and can be found on the RFS website, "Standards for pile burning". Burning off larger areas of native vegetation or a "Hazard reduction" will require approval from your fire control centre and possibly environmental approval. Contact your local fire control centre if in doubt.

Safe Burning

Even if you've been using fire on your property for years, safe burning is your responsibility. Every year, fire services attend to hundreds of fires which start due to the careless use of fire. In some cases, fires have been lit illegally. Many have escaped, threatening homes, crops and livelihoods. There are simple things you can do to make sure you use fire safely on your property and avoid becoming the fire risk to your community.

ON THE DAY

Check weather conditions like the fire danger rating, wind and temperature. Permits may be suspended during bad conditions. If there's a total fire ban, no fire is allowed out in the open.

If the fire gets out of control, call Triple Zero. It's important that you monitor the fire and have firefighting equipment on hand. If you have any problems, call Triple Zero (000) immediately

AFTER

Extinguish the fire and monitor it. Keep an eye on the material or area you've been burning and call Triple Zero (000) if the fire causes any concern.

WATTLES (Acacia sp.)

Don't let the word put you off when you think of the 'common' wattles you see around the area that are often chewed by cockatoos sourcing the luscious and fat witchetty grubs they love. These wattles regularly have die back on their branches and can look a bit tatty to our eyes due to the grub boring away inside them. There are many other varieties that grow well in our region and aren't necessarily attacked by borer.

I've just helped with the Bywong/Wamboin Landcare plant sale at the Bywong Boot Sale and we had quite a few trays of various wattle species ready for planting but relatively few people were interested in buying them. When asked why, most people said they had plenty of wattles and didn't need any more. However, I suspect that unfamiliarity of the beauty and usefulness of this amazing species of plants is to blame. Apart from the fact that there is usually a species flowering most months of the year, the bees and birds love them, they add nitrogen to the soil, they grow rapidly and therefore form a protective canopy to other longer-lived plants and they are beautiful in their own right. I can't think of another reason to grow them: Except for the fact that some are a great source of wonderful timber; they add colour and texture to our gardens with their silvery grey foliage, various hues of green, long or fat, pointed leaves and an amazing variety of lemon, bright yellow and different types of flowers.

Yes, I'm a fan and have a wide variety of wattles planted including *Acacia fimbriata*, *A. covenyi*, *A. hamiltoniana*, *A. mearnsii* and *A. melanoxylon* to name just a few.

If I've convinced you to plant a couple or more come along to our last sale this season at The Wheels of Wamboin as the soil will still be warm enough to plant before the frosts set in and hinder root establishment. We willave plenty of wattles along with eucalypts, ti-trees, bottlebrush and many other native plants.- Vicki Still

Kowen Kapers - Kowen Forestry Settlement



The Kowen Forestry Settlement was one of four such settlements established in the ACT. The other three being at Uriarra, Pierces Creek and Stromlo. Forestry settlements were isolated villages that provided permanent homes for forestry workers and their families. Such settlements were necessary at a time when the forests were distant from urban areas, road connections were basic and communication services poor. The provision of job-tied accommodation for workers also helped secure a stable workforce for the industry and provided for enhanced fire surveillance and management over the summer months.

Apart from the Kowen Homestead itself, the earliest forestry buildings were erected early in the life of the plantation and by the mid 1950s workers huts had been constructed throughout the forest including along Kowen Rd, Seven Mile Rd and Welches Rd. During the late 1950s the decision was taken to consolidate all buildings at the Kowen Forestry Settlement and over time the outlying buildings were bulldozed. Some traces still remain such as a rubble pile with traces of crockery within the pine forest near the corner of Kowen Rd and Macquarie Rd.

With centralisation, the Kowen Forestry Settlement took on the appearance of a village and continued to expand until 1972 by which time, along with the repurposed Kowen Homestead, there were 15 weatherboard houses, a forestry depot, workshop and site office and an orchard. The village had power and telephone connections as well as potable water from a bore that still exits today. The 1960 and 1962 plans of the site included a tennis court and community hall. However these were never realised.

By 1979, the historic Kowen Homestead, decaying through lack of maintenance, had been demolished and the same fate awaited all the other houses as time passed. By the late 1980s, changes in mechanisation of forestry operations meant that a full complement of workers was no longer required in Kowen and as



Today, only scattered building footings, some orchard remnants, the bore and water tower remain. Ironically, less than a decade after demolishing the depot workshop, a new workshop made of shipping containers had to be constructed. While abandoned as a settlement, the area is still an important site, housing the storage facility for pine saplings prior to planting. It is also the focal point of the Kowen (dirt bike) Forest Ride and the Kowen leg of the Rally of Canberra.

Route description: Refer to the route outlined in the March 24 edition. Once you reach the Old Homestead Picnic Ground, continue along the road heading south for a further 800 m. The most obvious clues that you have arrived are the water tower, a fenced bore, the remnants of an orchard and the concrete foundations of the forestry depot and workshop. As you explore the general area you may also discover the footings of other buildings scattered about the area. The return journey from Bingley Way is 10 km.



Bird Of The Month

For April I chose the Australian Hobby, a more infrequently encountered local bird of prey that I added to my property list recently.

Australian Hobby (Falco longipennis)

Size: 30-35cm (wingspan 90cm) Status: Uncommon breeding resident

The Australian Hobby is a rather small falcon with long wings and tail. It has dark slate-grey upperparts, rusty buff-rufous underparts, a buffy throat, and is streaked black throughout. Its dark cap extends onto the cheeks, forming an earmuffed or hooded appearance in contrast with the pale buffy throat, semi-collar and forehead. The bill and eyes are dark with a bluish cere and eye-ring, and yellow legs. Immature birds are duller and browner than adults with buffy mottling in the plumage. Hobbies are usually found in singles or pairs in open habitats such as grasslands, farmland and open woodlands. They do tend to have a preference for habitats near water. They are an active bird of prey, often on the wing, where their shape is distinct; thin and slender, with long pointy wings and tail. They are a fast, acrobatic, species, chasing and catching their main prey of small birds and insects in the air. They often also consume their meals while on the wing. Hobbies mainly fly low, only irregularly soaring, but always with flaps. They sometimes can be seen perched on exposed branches or wires from which they have a clear vantage point of the habitat. Like most birds of prey they are rather quiet, only occasionally giving a shrill repetitive "kek-kekkek" call. Hobbies tend to wander widely within an area in response to food, so their presence at a certain site is usually patchy and rarely reliable. They can be similar to the Peregrine Falcon, however Hobbies are much smaller and more slender, with notably long wings and tail compared to the body, and the underparts are rusty-rufous (not whitish) and streaked (not barred). Hobbies also have more pale areas on the head including the pale semi-collar (giving an "earmuffed" appearance, rather than a near-complete dark hood), and they lack yellow cere and eye-ring of Peregrine Falcons. Make sure to keep an eye out for one around your place.

What the Heck Chapter 22

The rebuilding of the 'Wamboin' sign on the corner of Norton and Sutton roads brings to mind the memorial wall at the St Andrews church in Wamboin, and the proposed building of a similar wall at St Peters in Sutton.

The St Andrews wall, which is also stone though it is a retaining wall not a sign, was built some years ago to provide a place where local people could have a spot to relax and remember passed loved ones. The wall is not a columbarium; ashes cannot be placed in the wall, but, with permission, it may be possible to sprinkle some ash into the garden behind the wall.

The intention is to affix a plaque to the stone wall with some basic details of the person, usually name, dates of life, family relationship; just a few hints to allow other observers to get a minds picture of the deceased person. The plaques are all the same size and style; all are equal in God's eyes.

There are seats where one can sit and ponder on the life of the person and, if was known personally, reflect on times and events which have a place in one's heart. The surrounding lawns and garden create a pleasant calm spot to just remember and

relive. The nearby road is not of constant traffic so it is possible to just quietly sit, listen

'A kangaroo killed by four young ladies' By David McDonald

Animal cruelty alert: the article presented here represents the values, practices, and language of the colonial era in NSW, rather than those of today.

Wyanga was the name in the colonial era and early 20th century for the eastern part of Wamboin and the south-eastern part of Bywong, stretching from somewhere west of today's Weeroona Road to the Lake George Range escarpment. As I documented some years ago, a public school operated there—the Wyanga school—from 1870 to 1874 (including some periods of closure). It was located on the western side of Reedy Creek, downhill from the former end-of-road turning circle on Weeroona Drive.

From August 1872 the teacher was Mrs Mary Whyte (sometimes written as 'White'). She was the daughter of local selector Edward Murphy—she had no teacher training but was assessed by the Dept of Education district inspector as being 'reasonably competent'.

The *Queanbeyan Age* issue of 13 February 1874 contained an article, on page 2, headed 'A kangaroo killed by four young ladies':

Last Thursday evening as Mrs J. J. (*sic*) Whyte, teacher of the Provisional Public School of Wyanga, near Bungendore, and the Misses Smith and Miss E. Murphy were quietly conversing, a monster kangaroo was seen to pass the window, hopping along very quietly, when the ladies ran out making a cry, and a little poodle taking up the chase, the Kangaroo became so alarmed that it immediately bounded off at top speed. However there was a very deep waterhole just in front of the school door, and the affrighted animal jumped in, being, we suppose, too frightened to look for a crossing place. The ladies immediately armed themselves with sticks and commenced pelting it. After receiving a couple of blows from the well directed aim of Miss M. A. Smith, and one from Miss Murphy, it became so enraged that it made a tremendous spring at Miss Emily Smith and Miss Murphy, who were nearest the kangaroo. Fortunately the former young lady held a long stick, and she courageously struck the animal on the head as it was in the act of leaping up the bank. In the meantime Mrs Whyte and Miss M. A. Smith ran to the assistance of their friends, and were just in time, as the infuriated animal was recovering, to give it a few more good blows, when it sank exhausted. Had the ladies ran when attacked, it is more than probable it would have done some harm, as there was no means of escape. When got out of the water in about an hour after, by a young gentleman, it was found to measure eight feet from tip of tail to nose.

The Queanbeyan Age article, as we might say today, went viral! It was reproduced in numerous newspapers, including the Albury Banner and Wodonga Express, Armidale Express and New England General Advertiser, Australian Town and Country Journal (Sydney), Brisbane Courier, Express and Telegraph (Adelaide), Gippsland Mercury, Illawarra Mercury, South Australian Advertiser (Adelaide), South Australian Chronicle and Weekly Mail (Adelaide), The Age (Melbourne), and the Weekly Times (Melbourne).

While most of the papers reproduced the article verbatim, the editor of the *Gippsland Mercury* took a different approach. They titled their article FEMALE GLADIATORS and prefaced it 'Four young ladies have distinguished themselves at Wyanga, near Bungendore, by killing a ferocious kangaroo. The monster passed the window at which they were seated, and ran into a deep waterhole. Arming themselves with sticks, the quartet sought the denizen of the woods, which might reasonably have expected milder treatment from the softest sex. What follows we leave the *Queanbeyan Age* to tell: ...' and then quoted from the original piece. They concluded with the following parenthetical statement '[One fails to see what distinctions these four "young ladies" have acquired by going out of their way to beat an unoffending animal to death]'.


An apology to the golfers for not providing an update on the recent events conducted by the Wamboin Golf fraternity. An update to follow for the December, January, February and March competitions.

We came to Wamboin 20 years ago from Gundaroo. We were looking for something more private and natural. We found it in our Box Grassy Woodlands, Yellow Box, Stringy Bark Brittle Gum, Apple Box, Scribbly Gum, Orchids, Peas, and animals. The understorey was mostly *Acacia dealbata, Daviesia mimosoides*. The birds were there. And as the land returned to its natural habitat we attracted more and more birds.

In Wamboin, Eastern Grey Kangaroo were plentiful. In fact Wamboin is an Aboriginal word for Eastern Grey Kangaroo. We live near

a kangaroo corridor. They are our lawn mowers, except in the last two years of much rain. We also see Swampy Tailed Wallaby; two, but they live across the road. In spring we notice our resident echidna.

As time went by and the land was naturally regenerating we see more and more different species of

birds. One year around Christmas it was the Hooded Robn. Another year I was walking our dog Georgia, and we saw a baby Tawny

Frogmouth sitting in the middle of the dirt road. Ma and Pa were off to the side on a fallen log trying to encourage it to hop on but it didn't. It stayed where it was for at least a day and then was gone. The fallen log was *Eucaliptus bridgeanna*, Apple Box. The birds looked just like the bark. They melded into background. I continue to look into the tree but their camouflage is too good.

The land is undulating and our home faces north looking over a series of dams.

The soil is marginal but good for local natives. We have plenty of water; more than Gundaroo which seems to be in a rain shadow. The wind is quite something -- windier than Canberra and colder. We have snow about once a year. We are situated about 840 metres above sea level. We area like the wedgetailed eagles which fly overhead. Some days it is greyer than elsewhere but other days we don't have the fog seen in the valley below.

One day we will have to move and that will be a very sad day. Because of all the places we have lived in, Wamboin is our home.
